When you know you have a Minor fit, look to see if you have a Major fit as well.
The BARRIER

## BOARD 1



Did you remember to open 1NT with the South hand?
The $2 \downarrow$ bid shows $5+$ Hearts and ZERO to 10 points. It says do NOT bid again partner.

## BOARD 2 - TWO Things

When you have a Minor fit, still look for a Major fit.
When you have an 8 card Major fit ( Spades or Hearts) you will normally need 25 points to make game. When you have a 9 card Major fit, you can often make game with only 23 points.

## NOT THIS TIME THOUGH.

Full marks for this bidding.


Natalie had a balanced hand, too strong to open 1NT so opened the lowest of 4 card suits.
Pauline knew they had a minor fit but looked to see if they had a Heart fit.
Natalie had a bit too much to bid just $2 \downarrow$. This would have shown a minimum hand of 12 to 14 / 15 points.
Pauline had a 5 card Heart suit and more than a minimum 6 or 7 points, so bid game.
On this occasion it did not make but don't be put off, because it was well bid. Most other times it will make.

This follows some of the same themes as BOARD 2

1) When you have a minor fit, ( in Clubs here) still look for a major fit.
2) When you have better than a minimum hand, remember to jump a level to let your partner know that you have more than minimum points.

## Option 2 - Two important points

Those who have read my previous reports, may have read about the rule of 20.
Sometimes you can open with less than 12 points if you want to.


Add the length of your two longest suits to your points. If it comes to 20 you can open. It works best when the points are in the long suits.

5 Diamonds $\mathbf{+ 4}$ Spades $\mathbf{+ 1 1}$ points $=\mathbf{2 0}$. Just enough to open.
So what do we open?. Our longest suit. Yes the Clubs are better, but length before strength. Open $1 \uparrow$.

North bid $2 \uparrow$. This showed $4+$ Diamonds and 10+ Points. Now South can describe their hand. 2. showed a minimum hand with 12 to 14 (or maybe) 15 points and 5+ Spades.

Now Guy knew they had $25+$ points and $8+$ Spades, so bid game.

BOARD 11 - The Barrier. Going past the Barrier shows a strong unbalanced hand. A difficult concept.
When partner bids PAST the BARRIER, you must bid again.


If South bids $2 \boldsymbol{\wedge}$, that goes PAST the BARRIER.
When South opens $1 \vee$, the BARRIER is $2 \vee$.
A rebid of 2 goes PAST the BARRIER.
When you are supporting partners suit that does not count as going PAST THE BARRIER
So if South held this hand.


When partner bids $2 \boldsymbol{*}$, a rebid of does NOT go past the BARRIER as that is supporting partner. That will show $5+$ Hearts and $4+$ Clubs and a minimum hand.

## BOARD 12-A very tricky subject.

## Do we always bid our longest suit first? No.

When we have a weak hand with a six card Minor and a five Card Major, it may be better to bid the Major first, otherwise we will not be able to tell partner we have an all important 5 Card Major.

What about this hand? We are first to bid. We are not Vulnerable and the opponents are Vulnerable.
Does the Vulnerability make a difference? Yes it might. If the opponents bid and make 4at will give them a score of 620 .

If they can make $4 \boldsymbol{\leftrightarrow}$ and we bid $5 \boldsymbol{*}$ we will show a profit, even if they double us, if we can make 8 or more tricks.
5e Doubled, Not Vulnerable - 3 off, is 500 to the opposition.
Some will say that this hand is only 14 points, but I will say it is


- AKQ76
- 10
*AJ10976 much stronger than a normal 14 points as there are only 4 likely losers if we play in Clubs. 1 Spade, 1 Diamond and 2 Clubs.

If I open 1e, I may have to go past the BARRIER twice to show my hand. The question you have to ask is....am I prepared to do that? YES I am. I am sure there will be some that will disagree.


When West goes PAST the BARRIER with $2 \boldsymbol{\vee}$, East must bid again. With this bidding, West must have at least 5 Clubs and 4 Hearts, so East can bid 3 knowing they have a Club fit. West bids $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ to show 6 Clubs and 5 Hearts. Why? With 5 Hearts and 5 Clubs, you open the higher of 2 Five card suits.
